

Vermont Water Cooler - February Poll

Description of purpose:

The Vermont Water Cooler February survey is intended to gather Vermonter's thoughts towards the field of primary candidates in the upcoming town meeting day primaries. To this end, the Water Cooler team developed seven questions intended help understand Vermonter's thoughts about the candidates and issues they are running on.

Methodology:

The poll was conducted by IVR phone call to landline telephones on **February 20th**, **2020** (see Appendix A for full list of questions). Questions were presented to respondents in a multi-choice format in order to standardize results. Instructions for entering the intended response were included with each question. For example, "Press 1 if you think that...."

The survey population of **15,813** households was randomly selected from Vermont's registered voter list. The phone list was limited to just 802 area code numbers and deduped so individual households were not called multiple times.


The final number of respondents to the survey totaled **360.** The survey responses were then weighed for age and gender using a raking method to compensate for oversampling in either of these demographics. They were then additionally weighted for turnout score identified in the first question of the survey.

An accompanying web survey was launched on vtwatercooler.com on **February 24**th, **2020**. Data from that version of the survey is not included in these results.




Survey Results:

Primary Party – Nearly twice as many respondents plan to vote in the Democratic primary over the Republican one. Only 11% were undecided.



Total Responses: 302 Margin of Error: 6.30% *90% Confidence Interval


Democratic Primary – When asked which candidate they were most likely to support, respondents chose Bernie Sanders by over 25 points. Buttigieg and Warren brought up the next tier of candidates with Biden and Yang following. (Respondents who indicated a preference for the Republican primary were not asked this question)

Republican Primary – Trump loyalists are holding strong in Vermont with over 90% of respondents indicating they would vote in the Republican Primary support the current president. (Respondents who indicated a preference for the Democratic primary were not asked this question)




Gubernatorial Race – Governor Scott is the clear front-runner with a 20 point lead over his closest opponent. However, Zuckerman is gaining ground after officially announcing in January; more than doubling in support since our September Poll. Holcombe and Donovan haven't moved much, but the newcomer, Klar, has eaten into Scott's base some.




Lieutenant Governor – Tim Ashe and Meg Hansen are the clear frontrunners, however, 28% of respondents are still undecided. Debbie Ingram and Dwayne Tucker are a distant third and fourth.

Statewide Issue – When asked about the most important issue in the statewide races, taxes were the clear priority. Climate change was a distant second followed a three-way split between Marijuana, Minimum Wage, and other issues.
